Fast Facts from here and there

- A team at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore estimated that **55 million Americans** have hearing loss in one or both ears. Hearing loss is common among people 70 and older, according to the report. But hearing loss also affected 8.5 percent of those in their 20s and 17 percent of people in their 30s.
- The Consumers Guide to Hearing Aids can be purchased from HLAA at a cost of \$4.25. A 2008 edition is available. It is a 24-page booklet with side by side comparisons, but only with general pricing. The 2007 edition's sections listed are Conventional Analog (from \$400); Entry Level Digital (from \$1,000); Basic Digital (from \$1,800); Advanced Digital (from 42,800); and Premium Digital (from \$4,200). There are pages of FAQs, descriptions of each of the above general types, other informative articles, definitions of hearing aid terms, and what you should expect from hearing aids.
- The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles has announced that hearing loss is now being acknowledged as part of the voluntary contributions to which one may donate to when applying for a license plate or renewal as well as new driver's license. The donations go to The Hearing Research Institute, Inc.,
- Sound Pharmaceuticals, Inc has announced the filing of an investigational new drug application with the FDA for the clinical testing of a drug for the prevention of chemotherapy-induced hearing loss or ototoxicity. Currently there are no FDA approved drugs for the prevention and treatment of drug induced hearing loss or ototoxicity.

Judy Martin appointed by Governor to serve on the FCCDHH

The Florida Coordinating Council for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (FCCDHH) held its quarterly meeting on August 7-8th at the Embassy Suites Miami International Airport. The FCCDHH is a 17-member Council created in 2004 by Florida Legislature and is charged with coordinating services for the 3 million Floridians who are deaf, hard of hearing, late-deafened, and deaf/blind.

Eight of the seats on the Council were vacant due to term expirations. Governor Charlie Crist announced the new appointments on August 7, 2008. Judy Martin, Jacksonville, Vice-President of the Hearing Loss Association of Florida (HLA-FL), was appointed to the FCCDHH as the HLA-FL representative for a four-year term. HLA-FL holds two seats on the 17-member Council and joins Joan Haber, Sarasota, as the other HLA-FL representative.

Gov. Crist also appointed: Sharilyn Adler (Florida Chapter of the Alexander Graham Bell Association), Cindy Simon (Audiology Representative), Mary Moore (Florida Association of the Deaf), Julie Church (Parent of a Deaf or Hard of Hearing child), Susan Herring (Deaf/Blind Representative), Vicky Johnson (CART Representative), and Kim Gaut (Deaf Service Center Association)

The FCCDHH held a Roundtable Discussion during the Miami meeting to discuss the future direction of its efforts. Various stakeholders from around the state attended and contributed to the discussion and volunteered to serve on FCCDHH committees. The plan is to draft new legislation which, if passed in 2009, would broaden the authority of the FCCDHH and increase state funding for direct services for people with hearing loss.

In accordance with the Bylaws of the Hearing Loss Association of Florida), Article X, A., all Hearing Loss Association of Florida members in good standing are hereby advised that certain proposed Bylaw amendments will be submitted to the Board of Trustees for its approval on the October 4, 2008 Board Meeting in the Lakewood Park Branch Library, 7605 Santa Barbara Drive, Fort Pierce, FL 34951. All members of the Hearing Loss Association of Florida in good standing will be provided a forum for discussion before a vote is taken by the Board of Trustees. Please notify the chair in writing or by e-mail at least 10 days before the date if you intend to appear. Late notification will not be honored.

If you would like a copy of the 22-page Hearing Loss Association of Florida Bylaws adopted in 2007 by e-mail, please send your request to judy40@bellsouth.net. If you would like a black and white paper copy of the 2007 Bylaws, the cost is \$5.00 for each set. Please mail your remittance to Judy G. Martin, 8019 Leafcrest Driver, Jacksonville, FL 32244.

Following are the proposed amendments:

Under Voting Trustees (page 6)

1. e. All voting trustees shall **submit a signed copy of** and abide by the Duties and Responsibilities as set forth below to remain in good standing.

Under Vacancies, section 8a (page 13)

a. Any vacancies on the Board of Trustees that occur between Board elections may be filled in the interim by the President in **consultation with the Executive Committee**, subject to the . . .

Section 9: Removal from the Board (Page 13)

Revision: Any member of the Board of Trustees, including officers, may be removed from the Board for failure to comply with the duties, policies, rules and procedures as set forth in these bylaws or for engaging in conduct deemed by the President and the Executive Committee to be detrimental to the organization. This removal may occur after a vote by members of the Executive Committee, in which the majority of eligible Executive Committee members agree to the removal. In addition, any member of the Board of Trustees who is unable to attend a meeting, shall by telephone call or written correspondence addressed to the President, state the reason for his/her absence. If a Trustee is absent from two (2) or more consecutive board meetings for reasons the President and the Executive Committee has failed to declare sufficient, his/her resignation may, upon majority vote of the members of the Executive Committee, be deemed to have been tendered and accepted. Said Trustee shall be notified of this decision by certified mail.

Add Section 12f (new) : (page 16).

The public is invited to all meetings but shall not speak during the board meeting except by general consent of the members (majority vote). A public comment period shall be held following announcements and communications.

Add: #14 - (page 17)

Professional Advisors

Professional Advisors shall be appointed by the President in consultation with the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the majority of the remaining Trustees as their next official meeting. The term of a Professional Advisor is indeterminate.

Under Elections, remove 2c (page 19)

Since we have a deadline for filing applications for board membership (Aug. 15), provisions for nominations from the floor are not needed and the following should be removed:

(2c) Provisions shall be made for write-in candidates and nominations from the floor.

Remove: Article XI on (page 22)

Article XI - Standing Rules of Order

HLA-FL shall establish appropriate standing rules that will address issues that cannot be addressed by a generic set of By-laws. These issues are specific to the Association's needs relative to meeting time, meeting place, and meeting frequency. Standing rules may be changed by a majority of the full HLA-FL board with notice or by 2/3 without notice.
